Day 10 At Sea – Clockwise Walking - Stewards – Cabin Door - 5 Oct 09: The

clocks have been turned back nearly every night as we cruise in a westerly direction so we have been waking up earlier each morning. Today we woke up before dawn to a calm sea and sky with broken clouds.

The moon was still visible as the early morning light of the sun caught the tops of the clouds.
