**Day 8 – At Sea – Captain Eversen – Formal Night – Verlie - 3 Oct 09:** The day started with an overcast sky and calm sea. The humidity was high but not uncomfortable with temperatures in the mid 70s.

**Joe Kess:** At 11am we attended a lecture by Joe Kess who is one of the Exploration Speakers. Today he made a presentation that covered the expeditions of the Spanish and Portuguese as they explored the Pacific Ocean and established their first colonies. He also briefly discussed the evidence that Chinese sailors may have crossed the Pacific and actually may have circumnavigated the earth before Magellan. There exists a map that is reputed to be based on a Chinese chart created around 1400 AD. That chart, which was made before Columbus sailed to America, shows a recognizable outline of all the major continents of the world including North America and Australia. Apparently, the cost of the explorations and other technology became too much for the ancient Chinese dynasties to support. In the early 1400s they abandoned their leading position in technology and world exploration as the European powers were beginning to expand their influence.

We had lunch in the Lido as we usually do. The Hotel Manager, Henk Mensink, came by our table. Barbara thanked him for the presentation he made at the Cruise Critic Meet

and Greet session we had in the Crow's Nest a couple days ago. He said it was his pleasure and he looked forward to more interaction with the Cruise Critic folks.
